THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PINEY POINT VILLAGE MET IN AN EMERGENCY MEETING ON WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 30, 2017 AT 5:00 P.M. AT CITY HALL, 7676 WOODWAY, SUITE 300, HOUSTON, TEXAS, TO DISCUSS THE AGENDA ITEMS LISTED BELOW.

DECLARATION OF QUORUM AND CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Kobelan called the meeting to order at 5:28 p.m.

1. Discuss and take possible action regarding Hurricane Harvey, flooding, utilities, structural damage, wind, rain, law enforcement and other items related to Hurricane Harvey

Present at the Emergency Meeting was John Peterson of HDR, Inc. Mr. Peterson started the discussion by explaining the Flood Plain Comparison & Contours Map in connection with the flooding due to Hurricane Harvey. The color coding on the map indicated that the lightest blue color was for the 500 year flood plain, the light blue was to show the 100 year flood plain and the darkest blue was the floodway. He added that the enormous amount of flooding that was occurring was a different kind of event; this is an intense storm; the amount of rainfall has never been recorded for such a large area; from Corpus Christi to Beaumont and that there would be "consistent rain for 4 days". There was discussion that the water would continue to rise until Friday morning even though there was no rain. Harris County Flood Control released information that water in the amount of 16,000 cu. ft. per second would be released from Addicks and Barker reservoir adding an increase to flood water elevations.

Council discussed the potential of flooding after the rain. Rising water should be monitored. If residents currently had water in their homes; then more than likely they would get water again, maybe a little more; if they almost or didn't get flooded there was a good chance they would get flooded. Discussion followed regarding informing residents by email of garbage pick-up and restrictions, landscaping, road closures, drinking water and flood damaged items and debris pick-up.

Councilmember Kollenberg made the motion to authorize the Resolution prepared by David Olson, the City Attorney, to extend the Emergency Declaration. Councilmember Bender seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.


2. Adjourn
